# Impossible Identity and Instability of Representational Forms in the work of Dejan Kaludjerović

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Questions about relations between art and politics, and possibilities for art to play a critical role in our post-political era, are again on the agenda today. Like Documenta, and the Berlin Biennial, a recent event "Truth is Concrete" - a 24/7 marathon camp on artistic strategies in politics, and political strategies in art (Steirischer Herbst Festival Graz - 2012) - brought together various artists and theorists to debate this issue, among others Chantal Mouffe, Oliver Marchart, Michelangelo Pistoletto and Charles Esche. Against the mainstream view which separates art and politics, political theorist Chantal Mouffe advocates constitutive and inevitable relation between them. Drawing upon Gramsci's notion of "common sense", which is "thought through culture", Mouffe (2012, p. 10) ascribes the arts a focal point in our construction of reality. Our discursively constructed reality, she says, implies power relations which cultural practices either sustain, or challenge by calling upon dislocation of the current hegemonic order (Mouffe 2007). In this regard, it is possible for us to conceive how cultural practice that starts from the non-conformist position, becomes a part of the dominant artistico-political system: it challenges particular hegemonic order and transforms it by creating new forms of subjectivity. It is precisely at this point that the political dimension of art is revealed.

## Towards politics of agonistic pluralism

Kaludjerović's oeuvre should be most likely envisaged in this light. His work possesses overall logic to challenge a given symbolic order through the recognition of eventual recurrences, and to try to reveal their (un)truth by questioning memory, power of capital, and stability of representational forms. In this regard, he references cultural exemplars from the 1970's onwards – within the specific socio-political condition of "bourgeois socialism" in former Yugoslavia – to raise time and again, questions about values of present time, for the generations to come. In the repository of childhood, that is the abundant symbolic register wherein our "impossible identity" appears, Kaludjerović seeks those socially constructed objects we once identified with in favour of our present fantasmatic reality. He takes us on a journey through the world of cartoons, comic books, fairy tales, shopping magazines, toys and playgrounds, in attempt to recover his identity formation. Employing subversive visual methods, he locates the origin of the "inherent" character of the dominant power mechanisms of our present time and identity construction, as driven by the laws of capital. By illustrating how once dominant representational forms dislocated from their hegemonic position, that is partially detached from the dominant politics, may still challenge our reality, Kaludjerović acknowledges that every hegemonic socio-symbolic order, although temporary, does not disappear by being dislocated. Its existence continues in contestation with other representational forms, that is, in Lefort's (1988) terminology, within "the regime" that confirms the plural, agonistic and transformative nature of the society. According to Mouffe (1993, p. 77), the identity of such a precarious society exists within a diversity of discourses, temporarily fixed at the point of intersection of multiplicity of subject positions and in continuous process of identification. This is relational and, I would suggest an even more precise term, contingent identity. In this regard, it is possible for us to envisage how Kaludjerović "confronts the social untruth embedded in cultural artefacts in order to set free the potential truth that is also latent in them" (Ray in Stavrakakis 2012, p. 553), and that was subjugated to the dominant knowledge forms of economies and history at a particular

moment. Thereby, he reassesses rearticulation of contingent artistic practices and ontology of the arts on the one hand, and identity construction on the other.

## Towards ethics of the real

The main subjects of Kaludjerović's work, are the conjunction between consumerism and childhood, through which identity formation and stability of representational forms are questioned. His paintings, drawings, objects, videos and installations, are inspired by children's books and cartoons, and advertisements that used to place children at the kernel of consumerism. For example, the series of carbon paper drawings on toilet paper (1997) illustrate scenes and characters from the novels, The Three Little Pigs, The Wizard of Oz, Hansel and Gretel and alike; paintings from the series Can I Change My Career for a Little Fun? (Love and Rockets, 2007; Stripe Boy, 2009) relate to contemporary products of pop culture, namely the Happy Tree Friends cartoon; children posing for underwear advertisements, from the cycle The Future Belongs To Us (Pinocchio Boy, 2003), find references in the 1970's and 1980's shopping catalogues; while, Oscar Wilde's fairy tale *Happy Prince*, subserved as a pretext for the series of drawings titled *Fear*, *Selfishness*, Power, Indigo (Power), Mud, Rich, Corporation (2012). These works show how children, through identification with objects from their childhood, are immersed in cultures of consumption in such a way that every aspect of their lives is touched by a buy-and-consume mode. Kaludjerović finds it necessary to examine the impact of consumerism in order to assess identity formation and development in youth. Behind once carefree childhood, filled with funny games, tender stories and cheerful idols, he locates frightening and threatening forces, that are than disclosed in the titles, themes, tones and motives of his work. For example, while outlining Oscar Wilde's Happy Prince on six panels, Kaludjerović highlights the words "fear, selfishness, power, mud, rich and corporation", to draw attention to potential narratives and messages that may lay covert. Such collusive sensations that are often hidden behind attractively designed and popular products, reveal manipulating and coercive disciplinary power of a dominant universalist order, aimed at sustaining, through capital and consumerism, an image of a coherent and homogenous society. This practice shows how neoliberalism suspends differences through abstraction; by converting them into sets of preferences, that is taste, which judges what is good and what is bad (Chakrabarty 2007, p. 48). This way, neoliberalism employs moral imperatives that are not adequate for thinking about ethics and politics anymore, precisely because they engage antagonism by debating what is good and what is bad. Instead, the idea of dislocating and multiplying "good" rather than trying to reach a harmony of it (Stavrakakis 1999, p. 131), may provide an opportunity for the ethics of disharmony, a project which Alenka Zupančić (2000) elaborated in her book Ethics of the Real. Overcoming moral imperatives, which are a result of a traditional distinction between good and bad, these ethics strive to recognise "the lack" in the Other (Lacan) as a new bond among citizens (Zupančić 2000, p. 41), and recognize us as divided, heterogenous and agonistic subjects. This is what Kaludjerović's work engages with. By evoking sensations of unease and discomfort, through the multiplication of attractive and seductive popular motives, and by stressing the ambiguous character of represented forms and objects, his "images" underline how innumerous material messages encourage purchasing behaviour and consumption, in order to sustain a unifying subject of the liberal hegemonic order. By pointing to these (sometimes) hidden, however deeply embedded conventions within our reality, Kaludjerović calls for the dislocation of the existing political order, by moving towards a critic of the dominant symbolic order. This movement aims "to thematise our own attachment [...] to servitude", to acknowledge precarious character of every symbolic construction (Stavrakakis 2012, p. 565) and recognise the other as a condition for a personal freedom. His work suggests a need for a transformation act to be undertaken already in the childhood, in order to "decolonize" it from the dominant politics and economic logic.

Kaludjerović inquiry into the subject of identity and sociability, is not random or isolated from the specific socio-politic context of former Yugoslavia, where he spent his youth. For example, the print *What Did Tomorrow Bring Us?* (2001) shows the artist's parents, photographed in the 1970's, on a bridge, most likely taken during the time of popular journeys to the innumerous sites of 'natural beauty of Yugoslavia'. It actually consists of two pictures put together showing exactly the same place - on the left is a picture of the artist's mother taken by his father, who is to be seen on the right side, photographed by the artist's mother. However, the subject of this photo-montage moves beyond a quest for the artist's origin, or remnants of a past that influenced construction of his symbolic identity and sociability. It makes us question those forces that lead to a break up of an idea, that is, a displacement of a specific social order. In this particular case, we are witnessing an instability of a social order once associated with the idea of a unity constituted on the basis of a ethnic, cultural and religious diversity in former Yugoslavia.

#### Towards a dislocation of neoliberalism

For his solo show at Galerie Van De Weghe in Antwerpen, Kaludjerović has produced an installation that immerses an image of L. Frank Baum's, Tin Man, from the Wonderful Wizard of Oz (1900), with a children's swing. In the manner of his previous projects, this piece too reflects the artist's inquiry into (in)stability, that is, the truth of representational forms. This installation with two arm-like beams, bearing a swing on one, and a video on the other, has the head of the frightening, although smiling, face of the Baum's character. Initially associated with the carefree childhood (interpreted by way of the swing), this installation, upon secondary reading, evokes the sensation of the lack of self-confidence and instability, typical for all the characters of this novel - for Scarecrow and Cowardly Lion as much as for Tin Man himself. This feeling is confirmed in the video Keine Angst vor kleinen Tieren (No Fear from Small Animals) from 2004, which is projected on a hanging panel and establishes a(n) (in)balance with the empty swing on the opposite side of the beam. In the video, almost in stillness, three kids are restaging the scene on a poster-advertisement for children's garments, visible behind them. The poster bears the same title Keine Angst vor kleinen Tieren originally published in the German fashion magazine Burda, at the beginning of the 1980's. On this poster, three kids are dressed up in rabbit, cat and dog pattern rompers. A boy and a girl are standing, and the boy is pushing a carrot into the mouth of a second girl who is sitting between them. This scene, once accepted as an appropriate image of commodity, restaged in a contemporary context, reveals explicit sexual allusions. Keine Angst vor kleinen Tieren emphasizes the instability of representational forms, by setting free a potential truth hidden under cultural artefacts, thereby revealing politics and economic forces that had once established a social order. In other words, it shows how art participates in representation's "submission of subjectivity" under modern structures of power (Foucault 1995). In this regard, it is possible for us to conceive that power lies in the constructed symbolic order of the dominant ideologies, rather than in the representational form itself. This argument is reminiscent of Lacan's writing on signifier. According to Lacan, a signifier is the locus of the power, that offers to the subject/object stable representation through identification. However, identification is to be established within unstable and transformative politics, ideologies and other socially constructed objects, meaning that the subject/object is constitutive of socio-political life that is temporary, uncertain and transformative. In accordance, the empty swing, hanging opposite the video, may suggest a signified place which appears as the locus of the power that, according to Lefort (1988, p. 17), remains an empty space only to be temporarily occupied, in order to challenge and dislocate a dominant order symbolized here, by the video projected on the other side of the beam. Several questions arise here: what is this empty place to be filled with and to what degree are we able to decide about its truth? Which representational form does it anticipate? The artist himself has already suggested a potential answer to these questions.

In order to draw attention to it I will paraphrase the titles of one of the artist's pieces and one of his series, *What Did Tomorrow Bring Us?* and *The Future Belongs To Us*: it is the future that brought us, that (still) belongs to us; and it is to be anticipated in our present time, as a prospect of continuous re-institution and dislocation, which is to be an engine for a particular kind of sensitivity.

Most of Kaludjerović's work employs a process of creating patterns, simulating mechanical reproduction; either when he manually outlines Oscar Wilde's fairy tale *Happy Prince* on 6 panels, repeats a single motif of Pinocchio to create a fond for a drawing (*Pinocchio Boy*, 2003), or records the song *Je suis malade* (2008 - ) time and again. Filmed in the same fashion, the *Je Suis Malade* videos, feature a child striking the same pose in front of a dark backdrop. A boy or a girl performs Serge Lama's famous song *Je suis malade*, from 1973. The song is always performed in the original French, although the children are not familiar with the language. This piece of art, produced through multiplication of "the same" audio-visual motif, does not only assert how "goods know no language", it also tells the story about a childhood that anticipates adulthood, through the process of identification with the world of parents. The act of repetition and multiplication of motives that is often present in Kaludjerović's work, just like in the video Je Suis Malade, indicates those forces that aim at sustaining a social concept of totality and homogeneity, embedded in popular culture and the constructed symbolic order. However, by introducing slight variations, within the process of reiteration of particular motives, Kaludjerović asserts difference at the core of repetition.

# Towards mobilisation of passions

At the heart of Kaludjerović's work are sensations of unease and discomfort, that however, does not appear only as a result of repetition, but also as a response to the tone evoked by the empty playgrounds, lascivious and isolated children's portraits, frightening atmosphere, and old objects that were to be found in the playgrounds from the artist's childhood. Such provocative, and sometimes disturbing senses, are designed to mobilize passions, sentiments and language games, in order to provide the conditions for the political project, whose goal is to establish unity, out of conflictual nature and diversity. Such a project, advocated by Chantal Mouffe and Ernesto Laclau from their book *Hegemony and Socialist Strategy* (1985), acknowledges that alterity and otherness are irreducible, that society as a homogeneous totality is impossible, and that different forces are to be in contestation acknowledging the idea of a dislocated and multiplied conception of "good". Kaludjerović's work transforms the subjectivity of the observer by introducing sensations of unease and discomfort whilst remaining aesthetically enjoyable. The subject that Kaludjerović calls for through his oeuvre is divided and dependent on various subject positions and therefore contingent. It struggles to understand its own attachments to the servitude, in order to never again become fixed in a closed system. Through recycling his own "painterly" motives, and indeed his entire oeuvre, the artist further accentuates this process.

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

# Nemogući identitet i nestabilnost reprezentacionih formi u radu Dejana Kaluđerovića

#### KA REPOLITIZACIJI UMETNOSTI

Pitanja koja se tiču odnosa između umetnosti i politike, kao i mogućnosti da umetnost igra kritičku ulogu u našem post-političkom dobu,
ponovo su na dnevnom redu. Kao Dokumenta i Berlinsko Bijenale, i
dvadesetčetvoročasovni maratonski kamp o umetničkim strategijama
u politici i političkim strategijama u umetnosti "Istina je konkretna" (Steirischer Herbst Festival, Grac 2012) – okupio je umetnike i
teoretičare iz različitih delova sveta da raspravljaju o ovom pitanju.
Među njima su, između ostalih, bili Šantal Muf (Chantal Mouffe),
Oliver Marhart (Oliver Marchart), Mikelandelo Pistoleto (Michelangelo

Pistolletto) i Čarls Eše (Charles Esche). Nasuprot dominantne struje koja razdvaja umetnost i politiku, politička teoretičarka Šantal Muf zagovara konstitutivan i neizbežan odnos između njih. Oslanjajući se na Gramšijevu ideju o "zdravom razumu" o kome se "razmišlja kroz kulturu", ona smatra da je umetnost centralna tačka u našoj konstrukciji realnosti (Muf 2012, 10). Naša diskurzivno izgrađena realnost, kaže Muf, podrazumeva odnose moći koje kulturne prakse ili podržavaju ili osporavaju time što pozivaju na dislokaciju trenutnog hegemonijskog poretka (Muf 2007). U vezi sa tim, moguće je zamisliti kako kulturna praksa koja počinje od nekonformističke pozicije, postaje deo dominantnog (umetničkog) sistema: ona dovodi u pitanje određenu hegemoniju i transformiše je tako što stvara nove forme subjektivnosti. Upravo se tu otkriva politička dimenzija umetnosti.

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aluđerovićevo umetničko stvaralaštvo bilo bi najpogodnije razmaati iz ove perspektive. Njegovo delo poseduje sveobuhvatnu logiku preispitivanju datog simboličkog poretka kroz prepoznavanje ponavijućih događaja i pokušaju da razotkrije njihove (ne)istine preispitiinjem memorije, moći kapitala i stabilnosti reprezentacionih formi. vezi sa tim, on se poziva na kulturne primere od 1970ih pa nadalje unutar određenih socio-političkih uslova "buržoaskog socijalizma" u všoj Jugoslaviji - kako bi iznova postavljao pitanja o perspektivama idašnjeg vremena za generacije koje dolaze. U riznici detinjstva kao pilnog simboličkog zapisa unutar kojeg se pojavljuje naš "nemoguidentitet", Kaluđerović istražuje one socijalno izgrađene objekte i kojima smo se nekada identifikovali zarad trenutne opsenarske alnosti. On nas vodi na putovanje kroz svet crtanih filmova, stripova, ajki, prodajnih kataloga, igračaka i dečijih igrališta u pokušaju da poati svoju individuaciju. U postupku, Kaluđerović se služi subverzivnim zuelnim metodama da bi locirao poreklo "inherentnog" karaktera ominantnih mehanizama moći današnjice i izgradnje identiteta ona-) kako su ih uslovili zakoni kapitala. Ilustrujući kako jednom domiantne reprezentacione forme dislocirane iz svoje pozicije hegemoni-, koja je delimično odvojena od dominantne politike, mogu još uvek a dovedu u pitanje našu realnost, Kaluđerović potvrđuje da svaki egemonijski socio-simbolički poredak, iako privremen, ne nestaje ko što ga dislociramo. Njegovo postojanje se nastavlja kroz borbu sa ugim reprezentacionim formama, odnosno, Leforovim (1988) (Lert) rečima, unutar "režima" koji potvrđuje višestruku, takmičarsku i ansformišuću prirodu društva. Prema Mufovoj (1993, 77), identitet kvog neizvesnog društva postoji unutar različitih diskursa koji su renutno utvrđeni na mestu preseka mnoštva pozicija subjekta" i neprekidnom procesu identifikacije". Ovo je relacioni i, sugerisao h možda još adekvatniji termin, kontingentni identitet. U vezi sa n, moguće nam je da zamislimo kako se Kaluđerović "suočava sa ocijalnim neistinama koje su ugrađene u kulturne artefakte kako bi slobodio potencijalnu istinu koja je takođe skrivena u njima" (Rej u :avrakakis 2012, p. 553) i koje su bile podvrgnute jednostranim, vlaajućim formama znanja, ekonomije i istorije, u određenom trenutku. a taj način, on preispituje reartikulacije neizvesnih umetničkih praksi intologiju umetnosti s jedne i izgradnju identiteta sa druge strane.

#### A ETICI REALNOG

avne teme Kaluđerovićevog rada jesu spoj konzumerizma i detinjva kroz koje preispituje formiranje identiteta i stabilnost reprezencionih formi. Njegove slike, crteži, objekti, video radovi i instalacije spirisani su dečijim knjigama, crtanim filmovima i reklamama koje i decu stavljale u srž konzumerizma. Na primer, serija indigo crteža



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na toalet papiru (1997) ilustruje scene i likove iz bajki Tri praseta, Čarobnjak iz Oza, Ivica i Marica i drugih; slike iz serije Can I change my career for a little fun? (Love and Rockets, 2007; Stripe Boy, 2009) odnose se na savremene proizvode pop kulture, pre svega na crtani film Srećni šumski prijatelji; deca koja poziraju u reklamama za donji veš iz ciklusa The Future Belongs to Us (Dečak Pinokio, 2003), aludiraju na kataloge za kupovinu iz 1970ih i 1980ih, dok je bajka Oskara Vajlda Srećni princ, poslužila kao izgovor za seriju crteža pod nazivom Fear, Selfishness, Power, Indigo (Power), Mud, Rich, Corporation (2012). Ovi radovi pokazuju kako su deca, kroz identifikaciju sa objektima iz svog detinjstva, uronjena u potrošačke kulture tako da je svaki aspekt njihovih života dotaknut ovim modusom kupovine i potrošnje. Kaluđerović smatra da je neophodno proučiti uticaj konzumerizma kako bi procenili formiranje i razvoj identiteta u mladosti. Iza nekada bezbrižnog detinistva ispunjenog zabavnim igrama, nežnim pričama i veselim idolima, on pronalazi zastrašujuće i preteće sile koje zatim obelodanjuje u nazivima, temama, tonovima i motivima svog dela. Na primer, dok ispisuje Srećnog princa Oskara Vajlda na šest panela, Kaluđerović ističe reči "strah, sebičnost, moć, blato, bogatstvo i korporacija" kako bi skrenuo pažnju na potencijalne skrivene narative i poruke. Ovako

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varljive senzacije, koje su često skrivene iza privlačno dizajniranih i popularnih proizvoda, otkrivaju manipulativnu i prisilnu disciplinsku moć vladajućeg univerzalističkog poretka, čiji je cilj da preko kapitala i konzumerizma održava sliku koherentnog i homogenog društva. Ova praksa pokazuje kako neoliberalizam zaustavlja različitosti kroz apstrakciju time što ih pretvara u skupove preferencija, odnosno ukus koji rasuđuje šta je dobro, a šta loše (Čakrabartri 2007, p. 48). U raspravi o tome šta je dobro, a šta loše, neoliberalizam se služi moralnim imperativima koji više nisu pogodni za razmišljanje o etici i politici, upravo zato što prizivaju antagonizam. Umesto toga, ideja dislociranja i umnožavanja "dobrog" pre nego pokušaj da se dosegne njegova harmonija (Stavrakakis 1999, p. 131) može pružiti priliku etici disharmonije, projekat koji Alenka Zupančič (2000) elaborira u knjizi Ethics of the Real. Prevazilazeći moralna načela koja nastaju kao posledica tradicionalne podele između dobrog i lošeg, etika realnog teži da prepozna "manjak" u Drugom (Lakan) kao novu vezu među građanima (Zupančič 2000, p. 41), i time, subjekt kao podeljen, heterogen i kompetitivan. Drugim rečima, etika realnog teži da potvrdi neizvestan i/ili kontingentan karakter identiteta. Time se Kaluđerović bavi u svojim radovima. Budeći senzacije nelagode i nemira umnožavanjem privlačnih i zavodljivih popularnih motiva i naglašavajući dvosmislen karakter predstavljenih formi i objekata, njegove "slike" ističu kako bezbrojne materijalne poruke ohrabruju potrošačko ponašanje i konzumiranje kako bi održali objedinjavajuće biće liberalnog hegemonijskog poretka. Ukazujući na ove (ponekad) skrivene, koliko god duboko utisnute konvencije unutar naše realnosti, Kaluđerović poziva na dislokaciju postojećeg političkog poretka, time što ćemo se okrenuti ka kritici dominantnog simboličkog pokreta. Ovaj pokret ima za cili "da istakne sopstvenu privrženost [...] robovanju", uvaži neizvesni karakter svake simboličke konstrukcije (Stavrakakis 2012, p. 565) i prepozna Drugog kao uslov lične slobode. Njegovo delo predlaže potrebu da se preduzme čin transformacije još u detinjstvu kako bi se ono "dekolonizovalo" od vladajuće politike i ekonomske logike.

Kaluđerovićevo istraživanje teme identiteta i društvenosti nije nasumično ili izolovano od specifičnog socio-političkog konteksta bivše Jugoslavije u kojoj je proveo mladost. Na primer, print *What Did Tomorrow Bring Us?* (2012) prikazuje umetnikove roditelje, fotografisane 1970ih, na mostu, verovatno tokom popularnih putovanja na mnogobrojna mesta 'prirodnih lepota Jugoslavije'. Ona se zapravo sastoji od dve sastavljene fotografije koje pokazuju jedno isto mesto – sa leve strane je fotografija umetnikove majke, koju je napravio njegov otac, koji se vidi sa desne strane na fotografiji koju je napravila umetnikova majka. Tema ove fotomontaže ide, pak, dalje od potrage za umetnikovim poreklom ili ostacima prošlosti koja je uticala na izgradnju njegovog simboličkog identiteta i društvenosti. Tera nas da preispitamo one sile koje vode raspadu ideje, odnosno, dislokaciji



određenog socijalnog poretka. U ovom konkretnom slučaju svedoci smo nestabilnosti socijalnog poretka koji je nekada bio povezivan sa idejom jedinstva baziranog na etničkoj, kulturološkoj i religioznoj različitosti u bivšoj Jugoslaviji.

#### KA DISLOKACIJI NEOLIBERALIZMA

Za ne tako davno održanu samostalnu izložbu u Antverpenu (Galerija Van De Vehe, 2013), Kaluđerović je napravio instalaciju koja spaja sliku L. Frenka Bauma, Limenka iz Čarobnjaka iz Oza (1900) sa dečijom ljuljaškom. U stilu ranijih projekata, i ovo delo odražava umetnikovo ispitivanje (ne)sigurnosti, odnosno, istine reprezentacionih formi. Ova instalacija sa dve grede koje, poput ruku, na jednoj nose ljuljašku, a na drugoj video rad, ima glavu zastrašujućeg, iako nasmejanog lica Baumovog lika. Iako nas u početku podseća na bezbrižno detinjstvo (zbog ljuljaške), ova instalacija, na drugi pogled, budi osećanje nedostatka samopouzdanja i nestabilnosti, koje je tipično za sve likove ovog romana – za Strašilo i Plašljivog lava, kao i za samog Limenka. Ovo osećanje potvrđeno je u video radu Keine Angst vor kleinen Tieren (Nema straha od malih životinja) iz 2004. godine, koji je projektovan na viseći panel i uspostavlja (ne)ravnotežu sa praznom ljuljaškom sa druge strane grede. U video radu, skoro nepomično, troje dece oponašaju scenu sa postera koji reklamira dečiju garderobu, a koji je vidljiv iza njih. Na posteru je ispisan isti naslov Keine Angst vor kleinen Tieren koji je prvobitno objavljen u nemačkom modnom časopisu Burda početkom 1980ih. Na ovom posteru, troje dece obučeno je u štrample sa šarom zeca, mačke i psa. Dečak i devojčica stoje i dečak gura šargarepu u usta druge devojčice koja sedi između njih. Ova scena, koja je nekada imala status prihvatljive slike robe, ponovno izvedena u savreme-

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nom kontekstu, otkriva eksplicitne seksualne aluzije. Keine Angst vor kleinen Tieren naglašava nestabilnost reprezentacionih formi time što oslobađa potencijalnu istinu koja je skrivena iza kulturnih artefakata i tako otkriva politiku i ekonomske sile koje su u prošlosti ustanovile socijalni poredak. Drugim rečima, ono pokazuje na koji način umetničke reprezentacione forme učestvuju u "potčinjavanju subjektivnosti" pod modernim strukturama moći (Fuko 1995) (Foucault). U ovom smislu, moguće nam je da zamislimo da moć leži u izgrađenom simboličkom poretku vladajućih ideologija, pre nego u samoj reprezentacionoj formi. Ovaj argument podseća na ono što je Lakan pisao o označitelju. Prema Lakanu, označiteli je pozicija moći koje subjektu/objektu nudi stabilnu reprezentaciju preko identifikacije. Identifikaciju, pak, treba ustanoviti unutar nestabilnih i promenljivih politika, ideologija i drugih socijalnih konstrukata, što znači da je subjekat/objekat konstituent socio-političkog života koji je privremen, nesiguran i promenljiv. U skladu sa tim, prazna ljuljaška koja visi preko puta video rada, može da sugeriše označeno mesto koje se prikazuje kao pozicija moći koja, prema Leforu [1988, p.17], ostaje prazno mesto samo da bi bilo privremeno zauzeto, kako bi izazvalo i dislociralo vladajući poredak koji je ovde simbolizovan video radom koji se projektuje sa druge strane grede. Ovde se postavlja više pitanja: sa čime treba da se popuni ovo prazno mesto i do koje mere možemo da odredimo njegovu istinu? Koje reprezentacione forme ono predviđa? Sam umetnik već je predložio potencijalni odgovor na ova pitanja. Kako bih na to skrenuo pažnju, parafraziraću naslove jednog od umetnikovih radova i jedne od njegovih serija, What Did Tomorrow Bring Us? i The Future Belongs to Us: budućnost nas je donela i (još uvek) nam pripada; i nju treba da prepoznamo u sadašnjosti, kao verovatnost neprekidnog osnivanja i dislociranja, koji će postati motor za određenu vrstu osetljivosti.

Veći deo Kaluđerovićevog dela koristi proces stvaranja obrazaca, tako što simulira mehaničku reprodukciju; bilo kada ručno ispisuje bajku Oskara Vailda Srećni princ na 6 panela, ponavlja jedan motiv Pinokija kako bi stvorio osnovu za crtež (Pinnochio Boy, 2003) ili iznova snima pesmu Je suis malade (2008 - ). Video radovi Je suis malade snimljeni su na isti način, sa detetom koje stoji u istoj pozi ispred tamne pozadine. Dečak ili devojčica izvode čuvenu pesmu Serža Lame (Serge Lama) Je suis malade iz 1973. godine. Pesmu uvek izvode na originalnom francuskom jeziku, iako ne poznaju taj jezik. Ovo umetničko delo, stvoreno umnožavanjem "istog" audio-vizuelnog motiva, ne samo da potvrđuje kako "roba ne poznaje jezik", ono takođe pripoveda i o detinjstvu koje očekuje odraslo doba kroz proces identifikacije sa svetom roditelja. Čin ponavljanja i umnožavanja motiva koji je često prisutan u Kaluđerovićevom radu, kao i u videu Je suis malade ukazuje na one sile čiji je cilj da održe socijalni koncept totaliteta i homogenosti koji su utisnuti u popularnu kulturu i izgrađeni simbolički poredak. Kada, pak, uvodi male varijacije u proces neprestanog ponavljanja određenih motiva, Kaluđerović potvrđuje da različitost leži u srži ponavljanja.

#### KA MOBILIZACIJI STRASTI I OSEĆANJA

U srcu Kaluđerovićevog rada nalaze se senzacije nemira i nelagode, koje nisu samo proizvod ponavljanja, već i odgovor na ton koji pobuđuju prazna igrališta, lascivni i izolovani dečiji portreti, zastrašujuća atmosfera i stari predmeti koji su se pronalazili na igralištima iz umetnikovog detinjstva. Svrha ovako provokativnih i ponekad uznemirujućih oseta je da mobilišu strasti, osećanja i jezičke igre kako bi obezbedili uslove za politički projekat čiji je cilj da se uspostavi privremeno jedinstvo iz konfliktne prirode i različitosti. Ovakav projekat, koji između ostalih zagovaraju Šantal Muf i Ernesto Laklau (Ernesto Laclau) od zajedničke knjige Hegemony and Socialist Strategy (1985). priznaje da su drugost i drugačijost neumanjive, da je društvo kao homogena celovitost nemoguće i da različite sile moraju biti u sporu i time priznaju ideju dislociranog i umnoženog koncepta "dobra". Kaluđerovićev rad transformiše subjektivnost posmatrača tako što uvodi senzacije nelagode i nemira dok ostavlja ugodan estetski doživljaj. Biće na koje Kaluđerović poziva kroz svoje delo podeljeno je i zavisi od raznih pozicija subjekta i time je kontingentno. Bori se da razume svoju ličnu vezanost za ropstvo, kako nikada više ne bi bilo fiksirano u zatvorenom sistemu. Reciklirajući svoje sopstvene "slikarske" motive i, suštinski, svoje celokupno delo, umetnik dalje naglašava ovaj proces.
